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

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

The Cavallino Classic is an annual gathering of Ferrari owners and enthusiasts at the world famous Breakers Resort in Palm Beach, Florida. This year, the 25th annual event was held from January 20th to the 24th. The multi-day event included vintage racing, the "Cavallino Classico Competition" (CCC), at Palm Beach International Raceway (PBIR) in Jupiter, Florida on Thursday and Friday. The track was about an hour's drive from the host hotel. After lunch at the Breakers on Thursday, there was a 2 1/2 hour driving tour of Palm Beach. The final stop of the tour was the "Private Jet Reception" that evening. It was held at Palm Beach Airport where Ferraris were parked on the tarmac surrounded by private jets. Guests enjoyed good food and wine while enjoying the beautiful Florida sunset.

The Breakers Hotel hosted the "Galleria D'Arte Ferrari," one of the largest showing of original Ferrari related art each year. The "Classic Symposium" was also held Thursday morning at the Breakers. The three guest speakers spoke in depth about three rare and fabulous Ferraris on site. Friday evening was reserved for the CCC "Awards & Beach Club Party" held around the several pools at the Breakers Beach Club overlooking the Atlantic Ocean.

The main event was The Palm Beach Cavallino Classic held on Saturday. The Breakers golf course was a fitting venue for the approximately 150 Ferraris on display. It was not just the quantity of cars on display but the quality and rarity was simply amazing. The organizers tried to get as many of the "best of show" winners from the past 25 events as possible. That evening there was a gala awards victory party held at the Breakers hotel.

Sunday was a charity concours held at Mar-A-Lago, the former home of Marjorie Merriweather Post, now owned by Donald Trump. "Classic Sports Sunday" featured Alfa Romeo, and Ferraris and other marques such as Bugatti, Talbot Lago, and Delahaye were on display.

There are the facts about the event, but the facts do not do the event justice. I arrived at PBIR at 9 am on Thursday and was immediately struck by the quality and rarity of the cars in the paddock. There were three 250GTOs on the track at one time and over a dozen multi-million dollar vintage competition Ferraris. I enjoyed seeing the cars simply parked near their trailers or at speed on the track. PBIR offered several great places to photograph the cars on the track and when the cars were not on the track it was possible to get up close and personal. Nothing was roped off, and the owners of the cars were very friendly and allowed almost unfettered access to their very expensive autos. The weather was great on Thursday, however, it rained most of the day Friday. Despite the inclement weather I was able to get some pretty neat photos of the drum-brake cars Friday morning before it started raining too hard. It is not too often one can photograph Ferraris at speed in the wet.

I would recommend this show to any Ferrari enthusiast. Florida is beautiful that time of year and one does not have to stay at the Breakers or participate in all the events. The event can be a bit pricey if one insists on doing everything, but everything is priced on an ala-cart basis. The best value is the event at PBIR and the concours at the Breakers is a must. Try and stay a few days before or after the event in order to enjoy the Palm Beach area of Florida. All in all a great experience you may want to put on your bucket list.









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

On Saturday, March 12, we hosted a judging seminar for our members to bone up on judging criteria, learn how to be a judge, and find out what happens when you have your Ferrari judged.

We had 27 people attend the seminar which was held at the Ford Design Center in Irvine, CA in their large conference room. We showed the DVD judging presentation that is on the FCA national web site and handed out copies of the judging sheets we use when the cars are judged. We went through each sheet on what is to be judged, keeping in mind that the car should be presented as it came from the Factory. Guidelines were handed out on what deductions to take when judging the car for items that either are not correct, worn to a degree that they need to be replaced, or incorrect items added to the car since new. The guidelines help to standardize the points taken off for the items, with minimum and maximum points allowed. This is to keep the deductions in line and to help the entrant correct things for another show. Many questions were asked as to what would be deducted for certain items and a discussion was had as to replacement parts that were allowed without deductions.

There have been some recent changes in the scoring totals as outlined in the latest Prancing Horse magazine and in the National News Bulletin. Basically, all cars start with a 100 point total, and deductions are taken off that in 1/2 to 1 point increments. Previously, cars judged between 100 and 95 points, would have received a Platino (Platinum) award. There could be many of these in a class, rather than just one first place. The next Oro (Gold) award was from 90 to 94.5 points. There could only be one of these awards

per class. The last Argento (Silver) award was for 85 to 89.5 points and only one of these is awarded per class.

The new guidelines adapted by the Ferrari Club of America National Board are now Platino awards will be a maximum of 97 points, Oro awards a maximum of 92 points and an Argento award a maximum of 87 points. These will now be used for the FCA National meet and for Cavallino Classic in Florida. It my understanding that the Regions can still use the old system, which we will continue to use for our local concours events, because Ferraris are meant to be driven!

I would like to thank John Clinard for letting us use the Ford conference room and to Tom Brockmiller and Peter Riley who helped me with the presentation.





The weatherman threatened us with rain this weekend, so I left the full tread street tires Continental DW Extreme Contact on my instructional vehicle. I actually enjoy driving in the rain, but it is more fun when there is some tread in the contact patch. As it happened, there was very little rain the weatherman moved it to Monday at our request.

There were quite a few Ferraris, a Lambo and a couple of McLarens, driven by FCA members signed up for the event.

Caliphotography was there and I was able to obtain a nice set of high quality on track photos of most of the marque cars. This really helps to celebrate and memorialize the occasion. Anyone who wishes copies of their own can go to the Caliphotography site and order them.

The fact that this event is organized as a High Performance Driving Experience, with qualified Instructors included in the entry fee, means that it is one of the safest ways to enjoy your sports car at speed. If you have the right street insurance policy, such as AAA, you are also covered in the off chance that there is an issue on the track.

All of the Ferraris and McLarens are extremely capable sports cars, which means they can be driven quickly even if the driver has little or no experience taking the optimum line through the corners. This can lead to a cavalier attitude towards learning the correct lines. The Instructors work hard to show the students that the correct line is Smooth, therefore Fast. Once the line is well learned, speed naturally increases, with less stress to both car and driver. Less stress means bigger grins!

In addition to on-track instruction, there is a book by Edwin Reeser, III Race Track Attack







Guide -Willow Springs, which is a turn by turn guide - Turn Nine is the most challenging and has eight pages devoted to it.

BTW, a street speeding ticket at 100 MPH in California now carries a \$1000 fine! That money would get you to four track weekends, which I highly recommend, and you can go 150 MPH.









On a beautiful spring morning, 60 people were treated to two exceptional private collections: Aaron Weiss' Flying A Garage in Pasadena and Ben Reiling's Race Garage in Arcadia. Both Aaron and Ben were on hand to give us insight into their amazing collections and had some entertaining, informative and often hilarious car stories.

The Flying A Garage has over 40 cars, mostly pre-war convertibles including some very rare V16's. Some notable cars are Aaron's six V16 Cadillacs and two V16 Marmons (very rare), 1931 Duesenberg Model J, 1929 Auburn Boattail Speedster and a 1937 Supercharged Cord. All the cars are Pebble Beach quality. When Aaron is in the mood for a little more modern ride, there are the E-Type Jag and Speedster Porsche and several exceptional Mercedes-Benz. The restorations are world class and all the cars would be welcome in the finest automotive museums. The attention to detail on the prewar cars is the most impressive element, definitely lacking in modern mass produced cars.

Ben Reiling's passion is SPEED! Virtually all his cars are race cars or track stars, and Ben drives ALL his cars! Some especially wonderful examples are the 1966 Lola T70 Can Am car, the 1966 Shelby GT-350 Supercharged (1 of 52) the 1955 Devin Chevy racer, and the Bonneville 1929 B Gas Roadster which was clocked at 222 MPH when Ben last did a Bonneville run. His nearing completion racer on a fire-engine chassis with fire-engine engine is totally unbelievable! 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

LISA CLARK RACER AT HEART

"I would say definitely it's that intense focus, at the same time being able to make decisions quickly, not anxiously." Lisa Clark is gentle, cordial, collected. Making her acquaintance, few would likely fathom her behind the wheel of a 560-hp Ferrari Challenge racing car.



"I was raised by just my Dad, so I grew up as a tomboy. Dad was really into dirt bikes, so at ten I got my first dirt bike. Growing up in Arizona it's all about desert and throwing the bikes in the back of the truck. That was our weekend ritual, just spending time in the desert having fun on dirt bikes."

"I learned to drive in the desert in a Ford F-150, standard shift. I had to learn how to come out of those hills and valleys, let the clutch out to get back up and not stall." By the time Lisa got to high school, her Dad helped her into her first car. "We got a CJ-5 Jeep that didn't run. We towed it to the house and he had me watch him take everything apart and I had to put it back together! My whole summer was spent rebuilding a Jeep engine. It was a great bonding experience, and it all kind of revolved around an engine that just fascinated me."

In time, I bought my first sports car - a Porsche 914. I started doing autocross with the Porsche club and having fun there." Lisa later acquired her first Ferrari, a 348 and it was "amazing." "I loved the sound of that car. I just loved the manual shift and listening to my music. I would put on Bocelli and run through the mountains. I loved it so much, just that organic Ferrari feel."

Lisa, however, would soon face a somewhat unexpected dilemma. "I always wanted a brand new Porsche, but the deal was, as my husband said, 'keep the Ferrari for a year and when the Porsche comes in you'll sell the Ferrari.' I was like, 'Yeah, definitely!"

"Well, a year later they called. 'Your Porsche's here and its beautiful,' but I didn't want to sell the Ferrari. I handed them the keys and my husband was looking at me like 'isn't this the greatest—what you've always wanted?' I was trying to be happy because he made it happen for me but at the same time I was kind of disappointed. It was a real bummer because the Ferrari was just so fun."

Lisa never lost sight of her desire for another Ferrari. "That's when I hooked up with Beverly Hills and ordered a California. I joined the FCA and started doing some canyon runs and became friends with a few of the guys. I started taking it on very casual track days but felt like I wanted more." She soon learned of Ferrari's Pilota program.

"I went through Corsa Pilota and Evoluzione, and set my eye on Ferrari Challenge. I went to Sonoma, watched a race and really networked, started working with an instructor in a track car and started racing go-karts. If I can do that at my stage in life, Challenge would be great."

Lisa will start Ferrari Challenge next year after getting a little more time on track with the EXR series. "I'm going to do the first race at CoTA." Her plan is to complete the EXR season and continue in karting.

She will also soon enjoy another Ferrari experience, the May arrival of her 488 GTB. "It's yellow, black interior with yellow, bumble bee-like. It's very exciting, going through the motions, picking everything out."

Given Lisa's composure, its not surprising that she's going racing after all. "I absolutely think its focus, being on your game in the moment, in the actual second, being further ahead than that at the time."

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
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
