Tom Reu met me at 7:30 AM before the Drivers meeting, and I tasked him to list the names of all the FCA Ferrari Club members who were driving Ferraris (and some substitute cars). That was helpful for organizing the article, and I wish to thank Tom for the help, as I was walking on three legs due to a wrenched back.

I had a full dance card instructing numerous drivers, and one of the most notable was Jim Lewis in his new 488. The dual clutch F1 trans in the 488 is very intelligent- it responds to steering, throttle and brake inputs and also probably G-forces to inform it when to shift up, down and hold a gear. It also sounded glorious as a Ferrari should, despite the whirly mufflers.

Jim Saxton runs a well organized event, and there was no untoward drama for the whole weekend, as all had a good time. Eric Marston left his 430 at home and brought out a nice Lotus for the weekend. Terry Goldberg returned with his 2000 Grigio Ferrari 430, James Rice enjoyed the track experience in his 2004 458, and Mark Manda drove his well-prepped 348 TS.

In discussions I've had with thoughtful people, like Syd Mead, and reading Bob Lutz, there has been a feeling that we are moving to a future where high performance sports cars like our Ferraris will be treated akin to elite horses - kept in barns, transported to the paddock, then paraded for exhibition or races, then cleaned up and returned to the barn. Some of this push comes from United Nations Agenda 21, which has politicians changing the way we live in cities, by building dense living spaces near public transportation hubs. That makes the politicians more powerful, and citizens easier to control. It won't all happen















quickly, but eventually the freeways will be divided into lanes strictly for autonomous vehicles, with a few lanes left for cars that some of us will still keep because – freedom. Expect those "free" lanes to be crowded and taxed more and more heavily with the usual transponders.

Meanwhile, there will be a few facilities like Willow Springs International Raceway, Thermal, Chuckwalla, and others around the country where we can fully exercise the upper end of the performance capabilities of our prized Prancing Horses.

We've recently held our March track event at Willow Springs with our next drive during the first weekend in October. I hope to see more of you there to safely experience the capability of your Ferrari.

CPR stands for Cardio Pulmonary Resuscitation and is a valuable skill to learn. Realizing that medical emergencies can occur anywhere – including FCA events – the club organized a CPR training class on Feb. 3, 2018. Pirelli P-Zero World in West Los Angeles were terrific hosts and opened their facility just for this event. On arrival, the attendees were treated to coffee and bagels courtesy of Infinite Computing Technologies and also got to admire the cars and memorabilia in the Pirelli P-Zero World showroom.

Marni Kallestad was our personable and knowledgeable CPR instructor for the CPR training who provided a full set of CPR training aids, including gloves, face masks, adult and infant training dummies, and Automated Electronic Defibrillation (AED) machines.

Everyone was soon engaged in learning CPR procedures – no bystanders allowed! Starting with the basic techniques, they quickly moved on to practice chest compressions – first on the adult dummies then on the infant dummies. Using the mannequins, the attendees got to learn the proper way to perform rescue breathing on both adults and infants. Finally they got to connect and practice using the AED machines to in effect "jump start" a victim's heart.

The instructor also showed videos that not only illustrated CPR techniques, but other emergency and safety procedures as well. Finally, everyone took a test to make sure they learned all the CPR basics. All attendees passed and received a CPR certification card from the instructor.

The event finished with an excellent lunch provided by LA Spice in Culver City. Hopefully the newly certified attendees will never need to use their CPR skills, but if they do they will be prepared. Thanks to Peter Lund for taking the initiative to plan and carry out this valuable event!

Thank you for coming and most importantly, for having fun with good friends.



Bruce Leeds & Ferrari SpA

I was invited by South Bay Ferrari in Torrance (part of the Mattioli Group) to take a drive in a new Ferrari GTC4Lusso T. Arriving at the dealer on Hawthorne Blvd., I was greeted by Carlos Preciado, the Marketing Manager for Ferrari South Bay and Daniel Keizer, the Sales Executive. The car was right there in the showroom in Argento (silver) with black interior and it looked great.

The GTC4Lusso T is a replacement for the FF model. It is a hatch-back (or "shooting brake coupe" if you prefer) and has 4 seats. This variation sports a twin turbo V8 engine, and since it lacks the all-wheel drive components of the V12 GTC4Lusso, the engine is placed lower and further back for a more even weight distribution of 46% front – 54% rear. The seats are all in leather and the rear seats are big enough to seat 2 adults.

After Daniel gave me a brief tutorial on some of the car's operating features, he let me get in the driver's seat. It was immediately comfortable with electronic steering wheel and seat adjustments to make the seating position perfect. The car has all the modern features you would expect from Ferrari: full feature audio system, a 12.5" navigation screen in the center console and a smaller passenger display, as well as heated and ventilated seats. In modern Ferrari fashion, many of the controls are on the steering wheel so you don't have to take your hands off the wheel. There are two driving modes – automatic and sport manual. By the press of a button on the steering wheel you can adjust the suspension to better conform to road variations for a more comfortable ride.

The first word I would use to describe driving the car is "comfortable." Although the GTC4Lusso T is one of the largest Ferraris ever produced, it doesn't feel that way when driving. The car rides and drives like a luxury automobile. The steering is very precise thanks to the all wheels steering. In spite of having 602 HP and a 7-speed dual-clutch transmission the GTC4Lusso T can be driven very smoothly and is well behaved in traffic and while waiting at signals. The best part is the acceleration and handling. We had an opportunity to try this out while driving around the hill of Palos Verdes and the performance (accompanied by the exhaust note) is very exciting.

I was very happy to have the opportunity to drive this wonderful Ferrari. Many thanks to Daniel, Carlos, and the rest of the friendly staff at South Bay Ferrari for the experience. If you are looking for a great sports car with comfort, modern features, high performance – and room for 4 people, the GTC4Lusso T is a good choice.









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Jim Hunter Tino Mingori

"You see Ferraris that are two or three years old that have 800 miles on 'em. Well, mine weren't like that. In fact my 360 had 30,000 miles on it when I sold it!" Doug Prestine served as the 8th President of the Ferrari Club of America Southwest Region. "The fun of these cars is driving them. I'm one of the Ed Gilbertson disciples. It was always his view that these cars were meant to be driven and that's what I did with 'em.

"My theme as President was that you should become an 'Engaged Member.' Engaged is an interesting word that I repeated in my monthly letters and in all of the meetings; it's time to become an engaged member. Become engaged in club activities, in organizing club activities, and in driving these cars. These cars are meant to be driven, so get out there and drive them.

"I've always had sports cars. I had a Corvette back in '59. I really have been as engaged in Porsches, I've always had Porsches, and in fact I've got four of them now. However, I always eyed Ferrari every time I bought a new Porsche. I always looked at Ferraris, and at that time there wasn't a big price differential between the two, as there has come to be now.

However, cars alone have never fully drawn Doug's eye. "I've always liked anything mechanical, always had an interest and an involvement with either cars, boats, or airplanes. My real hobby was off-shore racing sailboats.

"We campaigned an America's Cup boat for a while. The boats are 12 meters, typically, but we campaigned a 10 meter (60 ft.) boat a number of years and had a lot fun with it. It was an old boat, built in

1929 for the King of Denmark. A friend of mine found it and brought it over from Denmark, Sweden, somewhere in Scandinavia. When we dropped it in the water at San Pedro off the ship that had brought it over, we knew that it was going to sink because it had not been stored properly and the planks had all shrunk. We had two tugboats there and it started to sink, but we got to the guys at San Pedro Boat Works before it hit bottom and restored it. It was a very fast boat and we won a lot of races with it.

"I did a lot of that for a lot of years, and then we moved to Denver. Denver's not a good place for boating. [laughs] I bought the old Husky Oil Company and founded the Frontier Oil Corporation. I took Husky, which was a NY Stock Exchange company, private and operated Husky in the lower 48 under the Frontier Oil name.

"While in Denver, I became involved with motorcycles. Upon my return to California, I went back to cars and I became engaged with the Ferrari Club, actually initially with the Pacific Region in San Francisco, because I was running a company in the Bay Area. I made a lot of good friends and I've always believed that it may start with the cars but it ends with the people. That is a slogan borrowed from Bruce Meyer with whom I became involved through the Petersen and through vintage car rallies.

"We were real active in the Pacific Region and did most of their events, but I've never been much a Concours guy because that ain't driving the cars. [laughs] I'd rather have a dirty car that's been used, than a 100-point car that either isn't used, or you had to toil two hours for every hour you drove it to put it back in concours condition.

"Ferrari started building a quite reliable car in 1995 and that was my first Ferrari, a 355 Spyder. I also had a 360 Berlinetta, and then a 430 Spyder. But when Ferrari dropped the world-famous shifting gate and went for the paddles, I lost interest and switched back to Porsches at that time.

"The first Ferrari that I became intrigued with, probably before I even had a driver's license, was in Rome in the 1950's. I was staying at the Excelsior Hotel and there was some guy that came to lunch every day in a Ferrari convertible. I remember it was red and it had a tan interior - imagine that! He would pull it in into the Porte-Cochere at the Excelsior, right on the Via Veneto, and he'd just get out of the car, leave it there, walk in, and nobody cared. I thought, 'Hey, that's pretty cool!'

"My family had a home up in the Lake Como area and my father decided he was going to give it to some shirt-tail relatives and I said, 'Why are you doing that?' He says, 'They need it. It's right on the lake. It's a nice old house. You can't get the money out of Italy anyway, and they need it.' I replied, 'Well, we could sell that house and buy a bunch of Ferraris and export them to the United States.' Well, he thought that was really a bad idea. [laughs] I remember when I bought that first new Porsche in '69, a 911T. I remember what I paid for it, brand new, out the door, tax, license, delivered, \$7,233. He found out that I bought that car and he thought that was absolutely ridiculous. 'What do you need a \$10,000 car for!?' He didn't know it was under, but for anybody to pay more than \$5,000 for a car, that to him was an appliance, made no sense. He had nice cars, but never a \$10,000 car.

"Larry Doheny lived up the street, and he had a 275 GTB 4-cam. If I remember correctly, it was white. I used to see that car quite often and it's Bruce Meyers' car today. Those were my two historical encounters with Ferraris. Neither one had a conscious carryover, but probably a sub-conscious one.

"I think they're both great cars. The one thing the Ferrari has a real edge on the Porsches is one distinct element and it's called excitement and there's a lot more excitement with a Ferrari - but as a result of that it also creates a spectacle. You just can't take 'em everywhere. They attract too much attention and that was another reason I went back to Porsche.

"Where I'd been active in the Pacific Region, I became active in the Southwest Region as well becoming Secretary, Vice President, President, then Chairman. Tino Mingori recalls, "Doug really brought an executive style to the club. His knowledge, being the head of a company that had a lot of people and infrastructure, he really knew how to run an organization." Returning to that time, Doug stays on message. "I'm not sure if it's . . . you know the second thing to go is the memory and I don't remember what the first thing is . . . I may have been the one who started the weekly drives, but I was a big proponent and in fact ran the weekly drive for West LA for the entire time I was involved.

"I originated and ran the Gourmet Ride and Drives for a number of years. I think everyone really enjoyed them. It seems to have started a trend and I know that some people still do those with the club. They've stayed away from calling them Gourmet Ride and Drives because they felt that was proprietary to me for some reason. I'm flattered by that, I think that's wonderful, but I think it's even more wonderful that some people have at least from time to time, if not on a regular basis, continued that tradition. I always did at least one of those a year. It was a spectacular . . . I mean really high end, good hotels a great meal with fine wines, we had a lot of fun with those.

"I became involved with this fella up in the San Luis Obispo, Paso Robles area by the name of Rob Rossi, who's a big land owner up there. He owns the Santa Margarita ranch and a bunch of hotels up there and Rob and I became friends. He was a car enthusiast. He had different cars including Ferraris and he and Wesley Hatakeyama wanted to do a concours for the benefit of Hospice of San Luis Obispo County. He and I, along with Wes, who is a Ferrari enthusiast and member of our Region, put together the Avila Beach Concours with the objective of becoming the Amelia Island Concours of the West Coast. Rob owned the venues, so we could use them on a no-cost basis to make a pretty spectacular event. We offered both a concours and high-end Gala together with driving events – there was an organized drive up and a competitive rally the day before the concours."


"We really actually loved driving the cars," Wes recalls. "I really enjoyed Doug and Joan, their personalities, wonderful. Doug is a very good driver and Joan is a really good navigator. We got along very well and had some really, really fun times during those rides."

As Doug so often says, "the cars were meant to be driven."

On March 24 we held a judges seminar at the Ford Design Center in Irvine, CA. We had about 30 attendees and some of them brought their cars so we could look at them after the seminar and point out some judged areas.

The aim of the seminar was to refresh current FCA judges in advance of Concorso Ferrari in Pasadena; to see if anyone is interested in becoming a FCA judge; and for owners of Ferraris who want to have their cars judged, but had no idea what was involved.












We showed the judging criteria slide show that is on the FCA national website. It discusses what the judging format is, the deductions taken and why, the awards based on points, and what to look for in judging the cars.

We discussed the three FCA judging sheets and the recommended deductions for various items to help standardize the process. Even though there are still some subjectives, deductions taken for non original items are common and well illustrated. The concept is that the cars are judged as they came from the factory, plus dealer options that are documented.

The questions from the attendees ranged from paint and upholstery issues and non-original exhaust systems.

Thanks go to Tom Brockmiller and Peter Riley for giving their take on the judging process, and many thanks to John Clinard of Ford for making the venue available to our club.



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

"They were at the Monaco Grand Prix and my mother was doing the lap charts with Jackie Stewart, Emerson Fittipaldi, Ronnie Peterson and all these guys, all hanging out in the pit lane together. Back in 1971, of course, all the drivers, girlfriends and journalists were all very close friends, so my mother was on the pit wall and Jacky Ickx, who is Belgian, has a French accent, and was a pretty naughty boy at the best of times, came along and said, 'Ah, June, you are looking very beautiful and you are pregnant and I think you will have ze twins.' My father walked up to him and said, 'Jacky, just leave my wife alone. Go away, drive your Ferrari, and bugger off.'

"Of course, at that time there wasn't a lot of technology in baby predictions and sure enough, 4 weeks later, Annabelle and I were born in London in July of '71 to June Margaret and Andrew Frankl. Twins. Fast forward six weeks to the British Grand Prix, and there we were in the double pram, walking down the pit lane – you can't do that anymore! We went past the Ferrari and Jacky said, 'Ah, you see, I was right, and I did it without touching!"

If Andrew Frankl's name rings familiar, it should. His contributions as a leading F1 photo-journalist since those heady days have made him a household name to those who follow Ferrari and Grand Prix racing.

"They actually met through motor racing, through a gentleman named John Selby who was involved in racing in the '60s. My father was covering motorsport and my mother was dating John. John said to my father, 'Oh, Andrew, I've got to go to a Grand Prix this weekend. Can you look after my girlfriend June for me?' So, my father being a good-looking Hungarian

made good on the promise, and definitely looked after his girlfriend." So well, in fact, that June became his wife. "My mother obviously thought my father was more interesting, and they started dating and got married. That's sort of how we were enthused with the passion at birth, by my father and mother who were both totally into motor racing.

"I remember my father used to sneak me in and I'd hang out in the Goodyear motor home. I really didn't know who anybody was. I was just having a good time, being a young kid with lots of stickers, decals, and baseball caps, so these are great memories. It probably wasn't until I was about eleven or twelve before I started being able to engage in conversations with the drivers I used to meet.

"I was very lucky tagging along with my father. I remember spending time with Ayrton Senna. My father helped create the first Hungarian Grand Prix at the Hungaroring in 1986 with Bernie Ecclestone. Marlboro was the big sponsor and they paid off the police in Budapest, so you had the motorcycle guys escorting Prost, Piquet, Senna, Mansell, and they were just flying, having a race from the airport. Prost and Senna were sort of laughing, they had never driven so fast on public roads with police. It was comical, a lot of fun, and of course a great privilege to spend time with those guys. That was a special time in F1. It was unique, the hi-jinx and pranks we used to play on each other. Obviously as a schoolboy, this was dream come true, right?"

Asked whether Nicholas Frankl might have once imagined joining F1's ranks, "I wanted to, however that wasn't something my father was particularly keen on, as you can imagine, because many of his friends were killed. As I started getting into it, I was invited by Ford to drive their Celebrity Car in the Ford Fiesta Championship in the UK. They had about 35 cars or something on the grid for my first race and I qualified twentieth something. The Celebrity Car normally qualified 35th, so the professional drivers were wondering, 'Who the hell is this guy? He's qualified 20th!?' I had a great time and started looking at single-seaters. I did some testing a Brands Hatch with Formula Fords and all sorts of stuff. I loved it, but the conversation was, 'look you're a really good driver, but you're not going to be world champion, so why bother?' It was a good point, I'm sure I would have never made it to F1. Most people don't, so there was little point in pursuing it. So we hatched a plan to start the first Hungarian Olympic Bobsled team around '93 and went from zero to the Olympics in one year, which at the time was sort of modern Olympic history.

"The irony, it was so funny because my father said, 'Listen, I understand it's dangerous, but at least there's no fire, you can't get burnt to a crisp.' I said, 'That's true Daddy, however, have you seen what happens to the crash helmets when one goes down the ice at 80 mph on your head?' It literally would burn a hole through the crash helmet, so it was very unpleasant.

"Sure enough, we qualified for the Lillehammer Olympics in '94. The entire team consisted of my father, team coach and Chef de Mission, my Hungarian brakeman, my mother making sandwiches, and my sister cheering us on. The opportunity to go to the Olympics was something very special. To walk in the Opening Ceremony, to be in the Olympic Village, Tonya Harding and Nancy Kerrigan were there as were Torvill and Dean (the British Pair), so it was a very special time. That kept me busy for 10 years. I competed in three Olympics and made some great friends.

"Like everyone else, I have always been in love with the passion of Ferrari. I remember going to the British International Motor Show and they had this red Testarossa on a big stand in lights, with a

single wing mirror. It was such a powerful image. I was reading every car magazine that ever came out, many which were my father's publications, so there wasn't a lot that I didn't know about cars.

"My father bought his first Ferrari in '86, a 328 GTS. At the time Ferraris were selling at huge premiums in the UK. He called up the Managing Director at Maranello Concessionaires and said, 'Roger, I think it's time I had one.' We went to pick it up together and I spent most of my teen years washing that car. I washed it by hand and knew every square millimeter of it. It was a fantastic car.

In 1991 we added the first 348 TS in the UK and covered 20,000 reliable miles in five years. It was a good cruiser, but not so great around racetracks! We also purchased the iconic body shell of Mansell's 1989 F640, one of the most beautiful designs ever, at a charity auction in '92. My Father now cruises around San Francisco in his black/tan California, which suits him perfectly. We visit the factory every year to enthusiastically test the latest beauty on offer. It's an awesome father and son tradition.

"I've had a lot of great cars. My first car was a Fiat Panda. It wasn't a great car but it was Italian and I received my first speeding ticket in it. They nabbed me going downhill of course! I then had a yellow Mini (a little go-kart), a Rover 214, and then a Renault Clio 16-valve which was a lot of fun, great handling, just a super car. I had scooters and an old Mercedes and then I ended up with a Jaguar XKR convertible which I liked a lot. I went from that to an Aston Martin, a DB7 V12 convertible which was very unreliable – I had a very good relationship with my mechanic. [laughs]

"Around '97 I bought a Lancia Delta Integrale off Eddie Irvine, who was driving for Ferrari at the time. Whoa, my goodness, what a fantastic car. It was Daytona yellow with Recaro seats. Irvine tweaked the engine in Italy, so it sounded like an F16 when it went down the highway. I knew Eddie and Michael both very well because I was working for Ferrari, running the Asprey sponsorship, the Queen's jeweler. It was the best job anyone could have ever had in F1, unless you were driving for Ferrari.

"I later bought a 355 GTS, which I adore. It's a '99, Grigio/Nero, six-speed manual GTS, a rare car. I think there's maybe two or three in the country with that spec and I've done a lot of work on it. It's a phenomenal car. I love it.

"I was fortunate to be invited to the launch of the Portofino, in Portofino, a spectacular event. Raikkonen and Vettel were both there. Then to be at the 70th Anniversary celebration in Fiorano was incredible. I managed to meet my girlfriend there, which I thought was very appropriate, to meet a beautiful girl at the Fiorano track and we are now expecting our first child – a baby boy! Of course, Italian names are on the list!

"Ferrari's been good to me. It's a great passion and being part of the Ferrari Club of America and the community here in California is very meaningful. We were at Edwards Air Force base for the celebration with Chuck Yeager. It was absolutely incredible, a fantastic experience, which could never have happened without Ferrari, without the passion of the organizers, Jim, and those guys. These are all absolutely unique experiences for us all to share, thanks to an Italian entrepreneur named Enzo Ferrari.



We are excited to add 5 new FCA members to our chapter, to bring our total membership to 19 with 14 on Oahu.










