


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President's Corner by Murray Cogan





Alain Prost and the 1990 Ferrari Formula 1 Tipo 641/2 S/N 121

While there is no disputing that Michael Schumacher is the greatest Ferrari driver and the best Grand Prix driver of all time, there were many before him who are legends of Formula 1 racing. One such driver and my favorite is Alain Prost.

Known as "il professore" Prost joined Ferrari already crowned World Champion in 1990 and brought with him the coveted Numero Uno on the car. At McLaren the year before, he beat his teammate Ayrton Senna to become Campione del Mondo in the last race at Suzuka. Watching Prost race a car was like watching poetry in motion. He was always smooth and had beautiful car control. He always portrayed himself as a gentleman and had very few exhibitions of emotional outbursts. In 1989, the FIA changed the Formula 1 rules banning turbo-charging and Ferrari produced an allnew design to contest the World Championship by John Barnard sporting a V-12 normally aspirated engine producing more than 600 horsepower. These cars were also the first to use the now common semi automatic paddle shifters located aft of the steering wheel. I consider these cars to be the most beautiful GP cars along with the 312 T, 312 T2 and T3 of the mid-seventies. Nigel Mansel and Gerhard Berger ran car numbers 27 and 28 respectively. Unfortunately, the combination of Prost, Senna and McLaren Honda was unbeatable in 1989. I will never forget the beautiful scream these V12s emitted when driven in anger I personally heard at Phoenix three years in a row. They were the best sounding Ferrari engines ever made.

In the late 1980's at the height of the economic bubble and buoyed by a strong Yen, Japan was enjoying a massive prosperity with humongous gains in the stock market and real estate values and every-

one was blessed with extra cash. The value of any model Ferrari had climbed to an all time high. Art Corporation located in Osaka was the largest moving company in Japan. Headed by a determined and caring founder Chiyono Terada, a diminutive lady looking very much like a typical Japanese doll, Art0123 as it was known, revolutionized the way moving was defined in Japan by providing an efficient system of virtually allowing the customer to just sit and watch as everything in his habitat was packed, labeled, loaded and moved the way a woman would want her belongings handled. Gone were the muscular, smelly sweaty men in t-shirts, replaced by clean, young boys and girls who had been educated in discipline and manners. This enabled Art0123 to become a very profitable business. Mrs. Terada's husband was a car freak and with the excess cash decided to form a car dealership called ArtSports. An impressive all glass tower dominated the premises that not only dealt in new and used contemporary exotic cars but classic sports cars as well. While the young energetic staff was enthusiastic, none of them knew anything about classic sports cars. At that time ArtSports was the biggest importers of gray market sports cars in Japan. Ferraris, Lamborghinis, Porsches, Mercedes, McLarens, Bugattis and all of their tuner variants were parked side-byside in their beautiful showroom.

Meanwhile the burst of the bubble meant the end for the so-called overnight brokers who jumped on the bandwagon during the eighties. As you may remember in those days we all miss, you couldn't go wrong buying any old Ferrari because it was already more valuable the next day. The young buyers of ArtSports, armed with literally millions of dollars were swarmed over by these types, and they were taken to the cleaners most of the time. With little experience they knew nothing about provenance, nothing about authenticity, nothing about restoration and nothing about what the real value of a given Ferrari should be. Case in point: They paid close to 3 million dollars for a F40 LM only to find that it was a replica. Some of you may remember my story called The Worst 100 Point Concours Restored Daytona in the World in a previous issue of Sempre Ferrari or The Finish Line. That was their car.

In the early nineties, Ferrari of North America President and CEO Gian Luigi Longinotti Buitoni convinced Luca Cordero Di Montezemolo, Chairman and CEO of Ferrari Spa. and the powers that be in Maranello that Ferrari dealers in the United States were not up to par with the image that Ferrari wanted to project and decided to launch a factory dealership with everything under their control. And so was conceived Ferrari of San Francisco located on the north side of the bay across the Golden Gate Bridge in Mill Valley. Standing next to a lagoon, the vast glass and stucco buildings did exude a Mediterranean influence. But one could easily see that the proposed budget for the completion of this monument was blown away by the fine details demanded by the Italian consortium. To pay for this



big hole in their accounting statement, Ferrari decided to sell some gems from their racing stable. Prominently displayed in their new factory-owned show room were two recent Formula One race cars, a

1989 F1 640 S/N 113 driven by Gerhard Berger and a 1990 F1 641/2 S/N 121 driven by Alain Prost. Together with a turbo era F1 car driven by the late Michele Alboreto, an F40 LM said to be the last constructed shared the showroom with

new Ferraris of the period.

The announcement of the newly opened showroom and the advertisement for the sale of these cars were shared in choice enthusiast magazines. Being a fan of Alain Prost and the 640 series F1 racecar, I called ArtSports and immediately got the attention of the young man heading their classic car division. Mr. K. (he will remain anonymous) was a Ferrari fan and his passion and enthusiasm for classic Ferraris were next to none. The only problem was that his knowledge was based mostly on information he read about in books, magazines and watching videos. The scary thing was that he ran the classic sports car division and had the authority of buying anything he wanted. Naturally the choice was quite canted toward his personal taste. When I contacted Ferrari of San Francisco, they informed me of a Grand Opening party the next week and together with ArtSports were invited to attend this event on the spot. Mr. K. arrived in Los Angeles and we flew up to San Francisco. Being aware that we probably would have no time to check into our hotel before the reception I made sure I was dressed to the hilt so that I wouldn't blow my cover that I was from Los Angeles and look insulting or disrespectful to the San Francisco crowd. We drove straight to

Mill Valley and toured the fabulous dealership. The architecture was something that would look at home in Toscana. The sales rep there informed us that Gian Luigi would be attending the event that evening. We got to see, feel and touch these cars as well as sit in them. We were introduced to Gianfranco Fantuzzi, the chief mechanic assigned to Alain Prost. He had been reassigned to San Francisco and came from the factory with the two F1 cars. Gianfranco directed the mechanics who carefully removed the body covers revealed the beautiful V-12 Formula 1 engine, compact transmission and the suspension componentry which were huge secrets in their active days. There in front of our eyes were mechanical masterpieces of the highest technological tour-de-force clothed in the most sexy formula car bodies. As I sat in this car and squeezed the steering wheel I realized that Alain Prost had a much smaller butt than I did but the suede racing seat signed by Prost and made by Schedoni felt comfortable indeed. I imagined myself speeding through Curva Parabolica at Monza onto the straightaway past the grandstands. This was as close as I can get and I was actually sitting in the seat. This car came in 2nd at the Belgian GP, 2nd at the Italian GP, 3rd at the Portuguese GP, 1st at the Spanish GP prior to the Japanese GP where Alain Prost's Championship fight came to an end and 3rd at the Australian GP where Senna was crowned the World Champion. While Mr. K. was ogling the cars I pulled the sales rep over and discussed prices. Being just a sales rep. but proud of his wares, he was unable to give us any break. Furthermore, he informed me that Ferrari of North America would not pay an outside broker any commission, period. With that in mind and enjoying a nice cup of espresso we awaited the arrival of Gian Luigi. For those who don't know it Gian Luigi comes from the famous Buitoni pasta family which manufactures all kinds of pasta and is definitely one of the nobility of Italy.

Mr. K. asked questions such as whether or not the engines were original, to which Gianfranco answered no because many engines were blown up on the bench, during testing, during qualifying or during a race. But the cars were fully refurbished by the factory prior to delivery. We were also assured these were not T-cars and actual cars that were driven. While we waited we were privileged to see the other cars that were available for sale. There was a superbly restored one-off 212 Export Coupe for sale and parked nearby. In a separate building, all the new cars were on display and true to Ferrari standard, the attention to detail and refinement of not just the display but the quality of the architecture including hardware and lighting fixtures were second to none. At this time I asked Mr. K. if he was interested in the Prost car. He said he was very interested but he didn't know if he could sell such a car in Japan. I reminded him of the significance this car had at Suzuka and with serious fans of both Prost and Ayrton Senna in Japan, displaying this car in their showroom in the middle of the new Ferraris would surely draw attention and lead to more sales. I further suggested running a tape of this car in action on a video to hype up the showroom. With that his eyes gleamed and soon thereafter Gian Luigi entered the showroom. At Suzuka in 1990, Ayrton Senna had 78 points and Alain Prost 71. If Prost won he would have 81 points and if Senna came

in 5th or less, Prost would have gone on to win the Championship. Therefore like the previous year, all eyes were on this race but in the first corner, Senna who had pole position and Prost who was second collided and went off course, thus awarding Senna the Championship. On this year the tenth anniversary of Senna's unfortunate death at Imola, I hate to bring it up that Senna later admitted to purposely colliding with Prost to ensure his win.

Gian Luigi was immaculately dressed in a fine Italian suit with a matching tie and kerchief neatly tucked in his breast pocket. After the greetings and handshake, Gian Luigi and the sales rep excused themselves and returned to ask me where we were with the possible sale. I informed them that Mr. K. was from Osaka and because of that he would ask for a discount and so a best price should be offered. Not surprisingly they then insisted that the price offered was already the lowest possible. I then excused myself to discuss the matter with Mr. K. Of course, Mr. K. said he wouldn't buy without a discount, but in the same breath he told me he was also interested in the Berger car as well as the F40LM or three big cars. Now that I had a bargaining chip in my hand, I went over to Gian Luigi and the sales rep and asked again for a best price for all three cars. Their eyebrows indicated a smile and dollar signs were flashing in their mind, but the suave Gian Luigi never winced once and instructed the sales rep to go calculate the offer. We all went upstairs to the showroom with wooden floors displaying classic production Ferraris. While we waited, I discussed the hope of the return of Ferrari Championship in Formula One with Gian Luigi.

At this time guests arrived for the Grand Opening party and Gian Luigi excused himself to mingle with the invited guests as well as dignitaries and the press. We also went down, joined the


crowd and enjoyed the superb cocktail party with a live quintet performing classical favorites. I was sampling a superb Chardonnay when Mr. K.'s jet lag caught up with him so we went back up stairs and no sooner did he sit down in a sofa he was cutting z's. Downstairs, Gian Luigi was on the microphone addressing the guests and welcoming them to their new facility. The sales rep came out of his office and waived to Gian Luigi down below. Soon we could hear his footsteps coming up the stairs and the two went behind the doors of the office. I glanced at the still sleeping Mr. K. and shook his shoulder. The two emerged from the office and the sales rep handed me the new offer. I showed it to the half awake Mr. K. and he told me to ask for more discount and promptly went back to sleep. I discussed the issue and Gian Luigi walked up and was visibly upset. I am sure that from his standpoint, he was not going to sell these precious gems to some dealer in Japan at a discount price. After some intense moments of negotiating back and forth, I decided to discuss my commission. I explained to them that either they include me in the deal or there just won't be any because I have total control of what Mr. K. will or will not buy, which was the truth. It was now time for dinner and Gian Luigi invited us downstairs to join him at his table but because Mr. K. was in no shape to even sit up straight I cordially declined his offer and excused ourselves. We left with the understanding that we would continue our discussion the next day as Mr. K. needed to sleep over the offer.

We checked into the hotel and headed to a Japanese restaurant because Mr. K. ate only Japanese food. While we savored sashimi and warm sake I asked him if Mr. Terada would agree to this purchase, he told me he wasn't going to tell him. The next morning we returned to Ferrari of San Francisco and Mr. K. signed

the contract worth a over two million dollars. The cars came with starters and spare tires and wheels but nothing else. The ensuing weeks were spent arranging for the payment and delivery of the cars which included another go around of payment schedules that were not in line with the purchase agreement, no doubt the result of Mr. K. having to explain his purchase to Mr. Terada. I spent considerable time suppressing the ire of Gian Luigi who expected this payment to lessen the cost of the fabulous San Francisco dealership. When the cars arrived in Osaka, they created quite a sensation and ArtSports enjoyed a steady stream of curious car aficionados and ultimately helped in the sales of their cars. There were even demonstration runs in Suzuka and at the private circuit in Aida where the Grand Prix of the Pacific was run. I continued to field questions such as what is the black button on the lower left side of the instrument panel below the red button. Each time I would call Gianfranco Fantuzzi and his answer would be that the configuration changed from race to race and locations of switches and its purpose have been long forgotten. The most entertaining question was if there was an owners manual for these cars. I am delighted to have been involved in such an important transaction involving my favorite Ferrari GP cars. SF

EPILOGUE:

ArtSports continues today as the gray market importer of exotic cars but no more classic cars. Mr. K. is in jail for using company funds to buy cars he sold for himself. Gian Luigi Longinotti Buitoni is the president of an Italian hi-speed watercraft company. Alain Prost's 641/2 was still sitting in the showroom at ArtSports as late as last year. Gerhard Berger's 640 is in a private collection in Japan. Shin Takei has several scale models of the 641/2.


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

Legislative Alerts

Legislation to Repeal Old Car Emissions Exemption Reintroduced in California State Assembly

AB 2683 amended

The bill replaces the rolling 30-year exemption with a fixed exemption for all pre-1976 vehicles. The rolling exemption is replaced by a provision requiring the permanent testing of all POST-1976 vehicles not pre-1976, as reported in the *Sempre Ferrari*, issue 5/6, 2004.

Legislation to Allow Illegal Aliens to be Able to Apply For California Driver's Licenses SB 1160

The Sacramento Bee and the San Jose Mercury News editorialized in favor of Gil Cedillio's SB 1160. It was also revealed that the proponents of giving licenses to illegal aliens have spent money on extensive polling and focus groups in their attempt to pass this new bill.

Don't be fooled by the big media companies and politicians about this bill. It rewards illegal behavior by giving government-issued identification documents to those who break the law.

One pillar of this bill allows identification cards from foreign consulates to be used to qualify for a driver's license. Below is a link to a study from the Center for Immigration Studies that outlines how these cards are abused, and how they encourage illegal immigration.

Contrary to public professions, this bill is not about making our roads and highways safer. This bill is about getting 2 million illegal aliens registered to vote in our elections.

An analysis of the bill reveals that there are no safeguards to protect our voting security. Voter registration forms require a driver's license number or Social Security Number. The bill requires the illegal alien applicant to sign a statement that driver's licenses can't be used for voting. But it does not require the Secretary of State to eliminate these potential illegal voters from the voter file. We will simply have to rely on the goodwill of applicants who are already breaking the law.

Please, tell the Governor to oppose SB 1160.
